Emergency Response

(Hurricanes, Tornadoes, Flooding and Snow Removal)



Environmentally-Sound Refuse Disposal

20 tons of trash are transported and disposed of every 10 minutes (over 1,200,000 tons per year).





Renewable Energy Production

We generate enough power for 80,000 homes or about 90 MW of electricity.





Refuse Collections

Collection of 10 percent of household waste and recyclables (approx. 45,000 homes)



Recycling

We've recycled about 1 ton of material per household per year for the last 24 years. Recycled 51% of total waste in 2012—over 600,000 tons.







Containers, Cans, Cardboard, & Paper

Single-stream recycling allows you to collect all of these things in a single bin.

Know the No's

Be careful! Certain items are not acceptable in your recycling bin. Don't be fooled by items that may be recycled elsewhere, just not at the curb (for example: plastic bags, phones, or clothes).

Clean & Empty

Drips that remain at the bottom of a soda can are OK. A half-full can of soda is not OK to place in your bin.

Un-bagged in the Bin No need to collect your recyclables using plastic bags. This makes it harder to process. Let your recyclables run loose in the bin! Recycle plastic bags at the grocery store.





Annual Recycling Rate Fairfax County



The annual recycling rate is calculated by comparing the material recycled to the municipal solid waste generated. The technique for calculating the annual recycling rate is defined in Virginia's administrative code, 9VAC20-130-125B. Fairfax County includes a 2% credit for having a source reduction program, as allowed by 9VAC20-130-125C(4).



Solid waste is combusted to generate over 80MW of electricity

Facility is heavily regulated with continuous emissions monitoring
